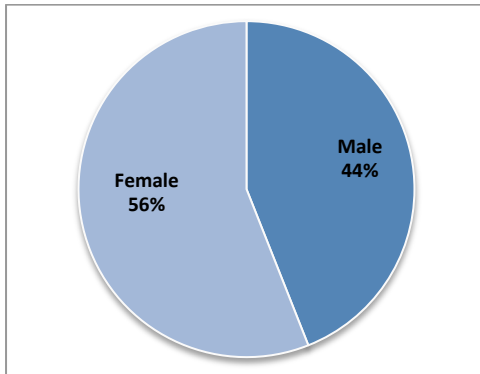

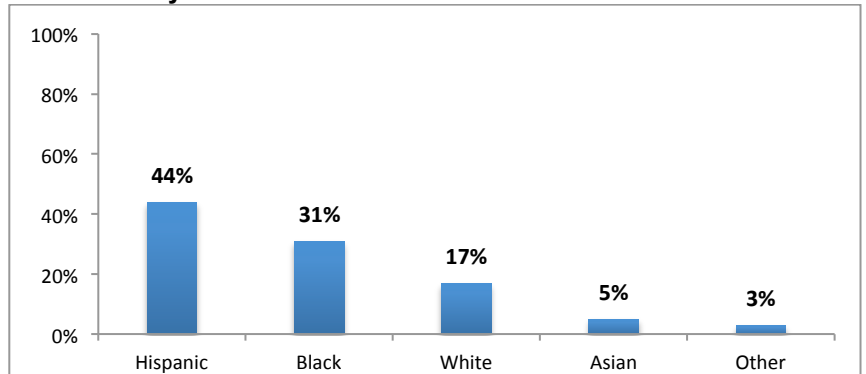

Profile for the entering 2012-13 class (Gender, Race/Ethnicity, Lunch Status, First Generation, LEP, IDEA)

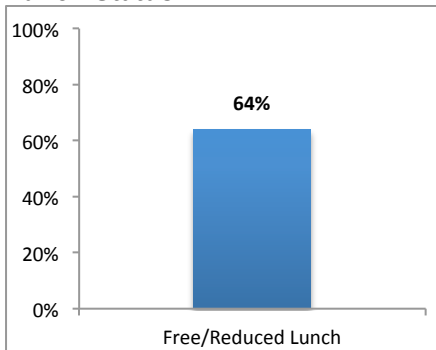
Gender



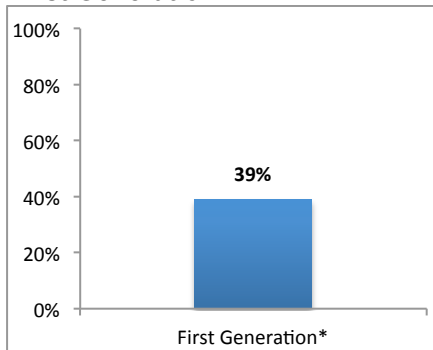
Race/Ethnicity



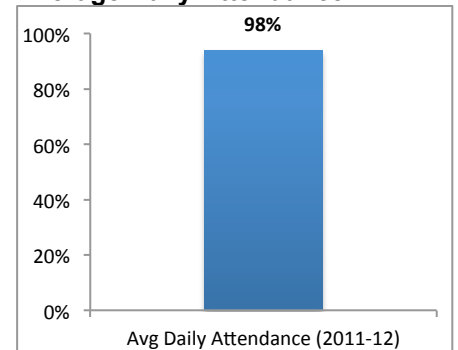
Lunch Status

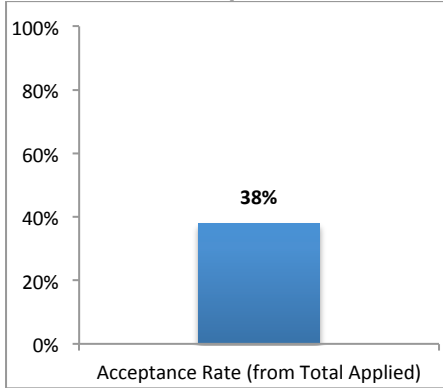

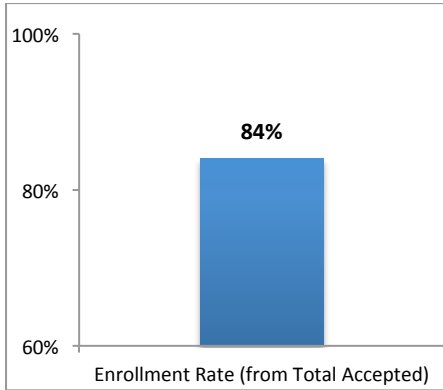

Admissions Enrollment Rate

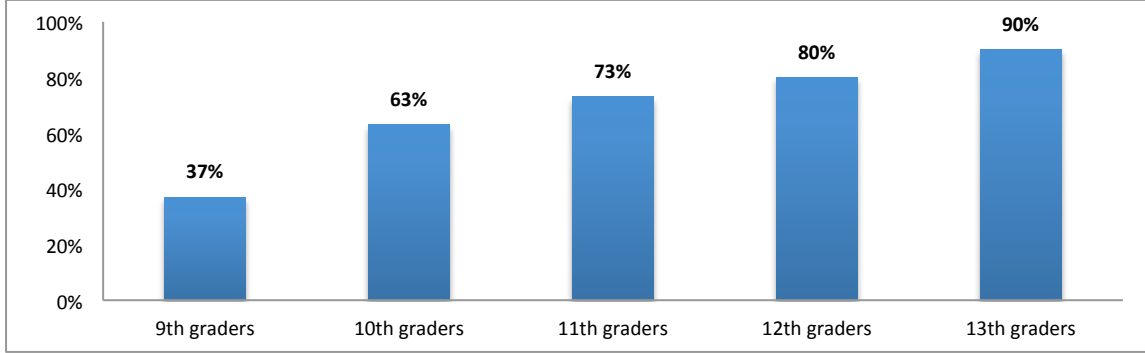

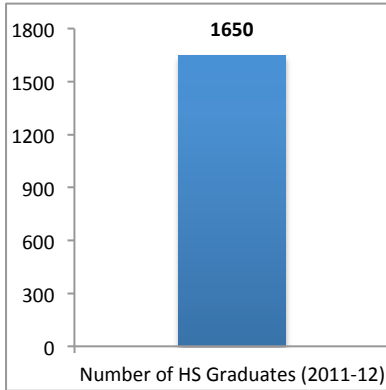

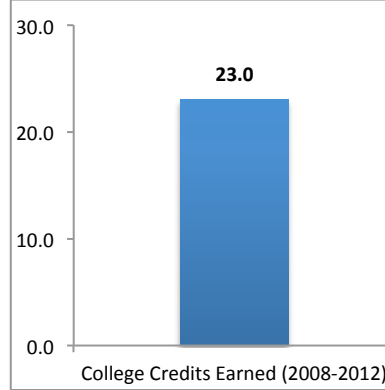

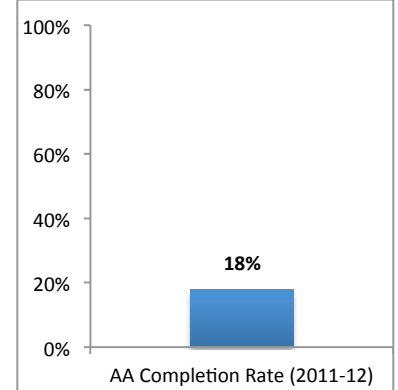
Number of High School Graduates

Associate's Degree Completion Rate*

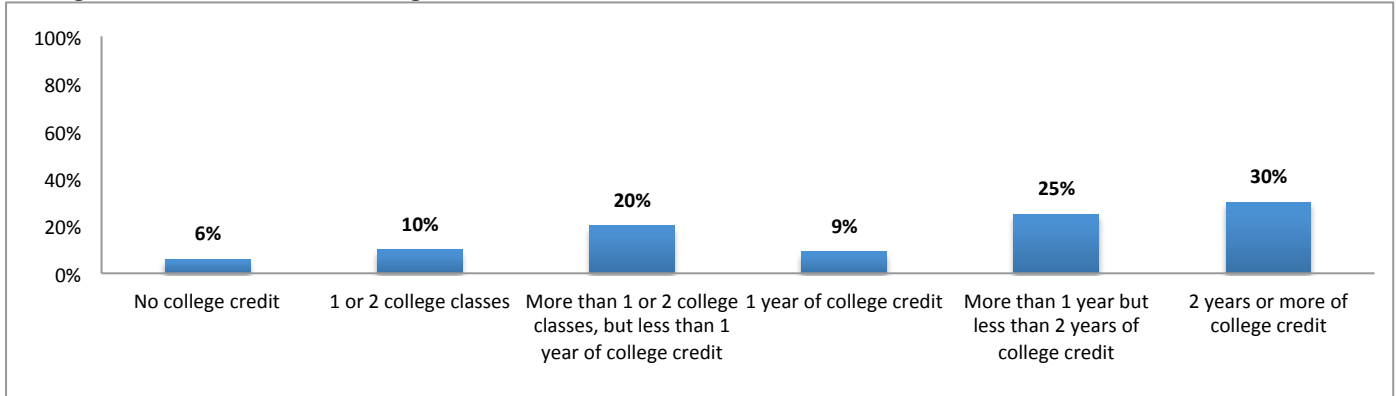

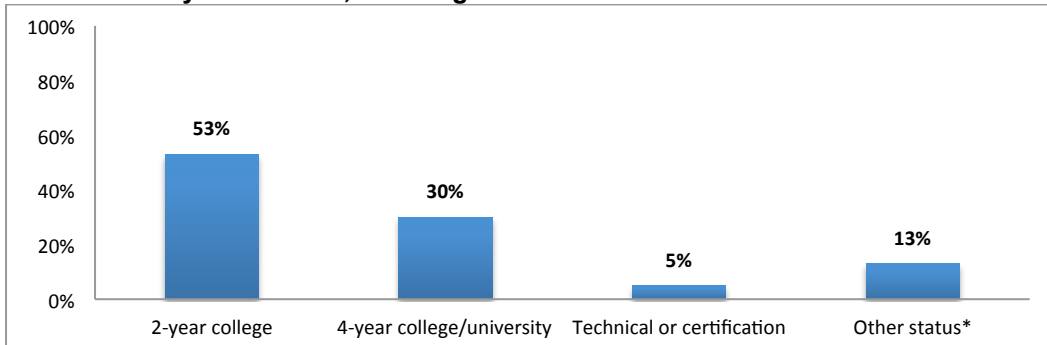
